making life better for all **Solutions to skills shortage**

efore 1994, many South Africans had few skills they could sell on the job market. This was because the apartheid system neglected the education of the majority of South Africans. The National Skills Development Strategy adopted in 2001 changed this. More than 6 million people have completed skills training in different programmes run by the Department of Labour.

■ Improve skills

The training has been done through government organisations like Sector Education Training Authorities (Setas) and the National Skills Fund.

The programmes are part of the National Skills Development Strategy. They are part of the government's plan to improve skills in the country and to make sure that people who have no skills get training so that they can make a living.

Some of strategy's aims are to:

- help create an environment that would grow the econo-
- support job creation for unskilled people; and
- promote the growth of small businesses.

To create opportunities for training, the government formed 23 SETAs. The Setas give workers, ordinary unemployed people and young peo-

ple opportunities to become part of skills training programmes.

■ 6-million trained

By March 2004, 109,647 unemployed people under the age of 35 had received training on learnerships coordinated by the different Setas. Three quarters (75%) of people who had completed this training were employed on a full or part time ba-

By now, more than 6 million workers have received training through different Setas.

The Department of Labour provincial offices have spent R1 billion every year to support skills training projects for unemployed people.

These projects have helped:
